CHILDREN STATISTICS, MALAYSIA, 2020

INTRODUCTION

This publication presents selected indicators on children in Malaysia. The publication consists of four (4) areas namely population, health, education and child protection. This publication provides children statistics which are useful for research and analysis purposes.

The first part of this publication presents infographic on selected children statistics, meanwhile the second part presents summary of findings by each areas. The third part shows statistical tables on the children in Malaysia as well as the time series statistics. The last part consists of technical notes for comprehensive explanation on the concept, definition and formula used to assist users in understanding the statistics published in this report.

POPULATION

Inter-state comparison show that the highest percentage of children under 18 years is in W.P. Putrajaya, 38.5 per cent (42.4 thousands). Terengganu records a percentage of 35.8 per cent follow by Kelantan at 35.2 per cent. Meanwhile, the smallest percentage of children under 18 years is in Pulau Pinang, 22.9 per cent.

However, in terms of number of children under 18 years, the highest number is in Selangor (1,790.2 thousands), Sabah (1,150.2 thousands) and Johor (1,069.1 thousands).





Exhibit 1: Children (under age 18 years) by state, Malaysia, 2020e

HEALTH

Analysis from children's health perspective showed that the principal causes of death for children under five years old was Certain conditions originating in the perinatal period which was 35.4 per cent. This was followed by Congenital malformations, deformations and chromosomal abnormalities (27.8%), Pneumonia (2.6%), Accidental drowning and submersion (1.2%) and Transport accidents (1.1%).

Certain conditions originating in the perinatal period and Congenital malformations, deformations and chromosomal abnormalities showed an increase of 0.7 percentage points and 0.6 percentage points respectively.

Chart 1: Principal causes of under-5 death (medically certified), Malaysia, 2018 and 2019




- A: Certain conditions originating in the perinatal period

EDUCATION

The number of registered child care centre increased 11.2 per cent to 4,903 in 2019 with the highest increase recorded in Selangor (19.7%), followed by Perlis (19.0%) and Pulau Pinang (16.5%).

CHILD PROTECTION

The number of children involved in crime has improved by 8.7 per cent as compared to the previous year. Based on the record, the first and repeated offenses also recorded a decrease of 8.0 and 13.3 per cent respectively.


Exhibit 2: Children involved in crime, Malaysia, 2018 and 2019




SDG INDICATORS RELATED TO CHILDREN


Malaysia has achieved target for Indicator 3.2.1 Under-5 mortality rate since 1984. Under-five mortality rate is 7.7 children per 1,000 live births in 2019 as compared to 8.8 children per 1,000 live births in 2018. The mortality rate for boys was higher (8.2) compared to girls (7.2) in 2019.
