EMPLOYEE WAGES STATISTICS (FORMAL SECTOR) REPORT FIRST QUARTER 2025

Median monthly wages in the formal sector rises to RM3,000 in March 2025

PUTRAJAYA, 28 July 2025 – The median monthly wage of the 6.8 million formal sector workers were RM3,000 in March 2025, as reported by the Department of Statistics Malaysia (DOSM) in its **FIRST QUARTER 2025 EMPLOYEE WAGES STATISTICS (FORMAL SECTOR) REPORT**. This figure was 5.5 per cent higher than the RM2,844 recorded a year earlier coincides with the steady employment gains, with formal employment numbers increasing by 3.1 per cent, 3.4 per cent and 3.6 per cent in January, February and March respectively.

Elaborating on the findings derived from administrative data, Chief Statistician of Malaysia, Dato' Sri Dr. Mohd Uzir Mahidin, stated that the increase in median monthly wage reflects a more favourable labour market landscape, supported by recent policy measures such as the upward revision of the minimum wage and the continued momentum of economic growth in the first quarter of 2025.

In terms of formal employees by sex, the number of Malaysian male employees in the formal sector stood at 3.7 million persons in March 2025, accounting for 55.1 per cent of total formal employment, with a median monthly wage of RM3,000. In comparison, female formal employees comprised 44.9 per cent or 3.04 million persons, earning a median monthly wage of RM2,982. As compared to March last year, the median monthly wage for male and female formal employees increased by 3.4 per cent and 6.5 per cent, respectively.

All age groups experienced wage increases, with the most substantial rise among employees below 20 years old, whose median wage surged by 13.3 per cent to RM1,700 in March 2025. This surge was significantly supported by the implementation of the revised minimum wage policy earlier in February. The number of formal employees also grew across all age groups, except the 20-24 age group.

Dato' Sri Dr. Mohd Uzir Mahidin further highlighted that the Mining & quarrying sector retained the highest median monthly wage at RM8,800 in March 2025, despite comprising only 0.6 per cent of total formal employment, marking a year-on-year rise of 4.8 per cent. On the other hand, the Agriculture sector, accounting for 1.9 per cent of formal employees, recorded the lowest median monthly wage of RM2,200.

Geographically, Wilayah Persekutuan Kuala Lumpur topped median wage rankings at RM4,445, followed by Selangor at RM3,300. Meanwhile, Sabah (RM2,000), Kelantan (RM1,800), and Perlis (RM1,800) recorded the lowest medians nationwide.

In terms of wages distribution, the Chief Statistician Malaysia stated that 27.4 per cent of Malaysian's formal employees earned monthly wage below RM2,000 in March 2025, marking a decrease of 3.8 percentage points from the 31.2 per cent recorded in March 2024. Additionally, the percentile analysis shows that the 10th percentile of Malaysian formal employees earned monthly wage of RM1,700 or less. However, this group registered an increase of 13.3 per cent in monthly wage as compared to the same month in the previous year (March 2024: RM1,500). Meanwhile, employees in the 90th percentile earned at least RM11,000 per month, reflecting a 4.8 per cent increase from March 2024. The wage ratio between the 90th and 10th percentiles indicates that the top 10 per cent of wage earners received six times the earnings of the lowest 10 per cent.

Concluding his statement on today's release, Dato' Sri Dr. Mohd Uzir Mahidin stated, "These statistics are based on administrative data sources obtained from relevant agencies, which focus on the citizens employed in the formal sector, notably in the private sector. Looking ahead, DOSM will continue to enhance the dissemination of employee wages statistics by integrating various administrative data to produce more comprehensive statistics for an extensive understanding of Malaysia's labour market."

Exhibit 1: Median Monthly Wage, January 2024 - March 2025




Exhibit 2: Median Monthly Wage by Sex, January - March 2025




Exhibit 3: Median Monthly Wage by Age Group, January - March 2025




Exhibit 4: Median Monthly Wage by Economic Activity, January - March 2025




Exhibit 5: Median Monthly Wage by State, January - March 2025




Exhibit 6: Distribution of Formal Employees by Wage Scale, March 2025
